A. Because men know the truth, they are without excuse.

B. Having a criterion to judge others shows that a person knows the truth. (Matthew 7:1; James 3:1; Matthew 6)

C. Self-righteous people misunderstand the height of the law and the depth of their sin.

III. Truth.

A. God is true--it is in his nature to be true. (Psalm 9:4, 8; 96:13;145:17; Isaiah 45:19)

B. Man's judgment is hopelessly distorted. (Hebrews 4:13)

C. God judges by true knowledge. (1 Samuel 16:7)

D. If our consciences condemn us, an infinitely holy God can condemn us all the more. (1 John 3:20, Hebrews 12:25)

E. We escape by running to Jesus Christ.
