- A. Marriage is a unique relationship that constitutes a remarkable partnership.
- A. A one-flesh relationship.
- B. The greatest problem in contemporary society is a blurring or roles in the marriage.
 - 1. Roles create responsibilities.
- II. Overview of 1 Peter.
 - A. Every passage exists in relation to a context.
 - B. Three major divisions.
 - 1. Salvation (1 Peter 1:1-2:12).
 - 2. Submission (1 Peter 2:13-3:12).
 - 3. Suffering (1 Peter 3:13-5:14)
 - C. These are not isolated doctrines. Salvation comes before submission and submission must come before suffering.
 - 1. Suffering is nonsense even to the believer who is un-submitted.
 - 2. Submission is foolishness until one has been redeemed.
 - D. Three areas of submission.
 - 1. Government.
 - 2. Employment.
 - 3. Family.
 - E. Submission is the lifestyle of every Christian.
- III. Submission (1 Peter 3:1-6).
 - A. Two principles for the wife.
 - 1. Character (verses 1-3).
 - 2. Conduct (verses 3-6).

B. Negative Attitudes.

- a. Sometimes you have to deconstruct some ideas before you can plant them. There is a great deal that needs to be torn down before people can accurately understand what you are telling them.
- b. Illustration: sharing the gospel.
- 1. Submission does not mean inferiority.
 - a. 1 Corinthians 11 deals a death blow to this concept.
 - b. A woman who even submits to the headship of an unregenerate husband is in no way inferior.
 - c. The issue is not how the husband treats the wife but how the wife reacts.
- 2. Submission does not mean intellectual suicide.
 - a. Verse 23—you commit yourself to God.
 - b. Ephesians 5:22; we have overemphasized submission to the husband and we have underemphasized submission to the Lord.
 - c. A woman who can submit herself to God is a woman who can submit herself to the Lord.
 - d. Only when we submit ourselves to the Lord are we intellectually freed.
- 3. Submission does not mean lack of fulfillment.
 - a. It is not a question of a woman doing her own thing but of a woman doing God's thing.
 - b. Romans 12—be transformed by the renewing of your mind.
 - c. We are only fulfilled when we do what is good, pleasing, and perfect.
 - d. A woman finds value in the body of Christ—not in the world.
 - e. You can only find fulfillment in the will of God as he has it for you.
- 4. Submission does not mean you become a vegetable.
 - a. "Be in subjection."
 - 1) Present tense in continuous action.
 - 2) Imperative—a command.

- a) "You will never learn to be a good commander until you've learned to be a good follower."
- 3) The action is reflective—the actor is the one who stands to receive the benefit of the action.
- b. Submission is an active attitude of voluntarily placing yourself under the will of God regardless of what it is.
 - 1) Ephesians 5—we are all responsible to submit to one another.
 - 2) Submission is the name of the Christian game.
 - 3) Philippians 2:5—"Let this mind be in you."
 - a) It is the mind where submission occurs.
 - b) Christ did not hold on to equality—he emptied himself of his own will, subjecting himself to the Father.
 - c) God highly exalted Jesus.
 - d) The way up is down.
 - e) The mark of humility is service.
 - 4) God only holds wives accountable for submission not for their husband's decisions.
- C. You will not be criticizing your husband if you understand the sobering responsibility he has; you will respect him.
- D. God is asking the wife to submit to a nonbeliever; the witness to him occurs through the submission.
 - 1. Personal example of a woman who tried to win her husband to Christ without words. The only reason he was ever won to Christ was because he saw Christ through his spouse.
- E. Women's adornment.
 - 1. Paul is not talking about apparel, but of the heart.
 - 2. Three contrasts:
 - a. Internal and external.
 - b. Perishable and imperishable.
 - c. Appeal to men and that which is pricey in the sight of God.

- 3. It is important to not look like an "unmade bed," but the emphasis is not on the external.
- 4. The primary beauty of your bride is not external.
- 5. We are all in the process of deteriorating, but if your beauty is internal, every day that Jesus Christ forms in you, you will become more attractive.
