I. Introduction.

- A. Text: Isaiah 53.
- B. It is difficult to see how one can read Isaiah 53 and not see Jesus.
- C. The Jews expected a different kind of Messiah—a military ruler.

II. The Lord's success.

- A. He shall be exalted.
 - 1. This is a reference to the resurrection.

2. No one had ever experienced a resurrection like His—He was the first born from the dead.

- B. He shall be lifted up.
 - 1. He was physically lifted up.
 - 2. This recalls the ascension.
- C. He shall be very high.
 - 1. He is lifted above all people. (Philippians 2)
 - 2. He astonishes people. This pictures His marred figure after the cross.

III. The Messiah's strange reception.

- A. He was despised and not esteemed by the people.
- B. At the cross, Jesus was a pitiful figure to behold.
- IV. The good news: Jesus took our place and paid for our sins.
 - A. Our transgressions have cut us off.
 - B. Sin is a disease and we cannot understand the depths of our depravity until we have beheld the crucified Lord.
 - C. Jesus is the great substitute for the sin of the human heart.
 - D. The problem is that everyone is doing things their way resulting in strife and conflict.

- V. The silent sufferings of Jesus.
 - A. Scripture preserves the sinlessness of Jesus.
 - B. He was without sin, but He silently bore the sins of others.
 - C. It pleased God to put the iniquities of the people upon Jesus.
 - 1. God could only take delight in giving His Son in His love for mankind. (Romans 8:32)
 - 2. God was willing to give His own Son for the delivery of the human race.

VI. Jesus would see His offspring after death.

- A. This refers to the resurrection.
- B. He would see those whom He redeemed.
- C. He would see a world free from heartache and pain.
- D. Man will share with Jesus the inheritance He has received.
- E. This is a love story. God's love awakens within us the reality that we need help.

Application questions:

1. How would you respond to someone who has a difficult time understanding how God can be good and be glad to give His only Son?

2. What is sin? How does Isaiah 53 describe it?

3. Some claim that the substitution of Jesus for our sin is not a reality in Scripture. What would you say based upon the passage? Defend your answer.
