I. Introduction.

- A. Text: Mark 7.
- B. Jesus spent almost a third of His ministry with the Gentiles.
- C. This story reminds us the importance of faith.

II. There is a great challenge that is represented in being deaf and dumb, which symbolizes a spiritual truth.

A. It is an embarrassment to be deaf and dumb, so the Lord deals with the man privately.

B. Jesus told the man to be open—He acts out to him what He wants to convey to him so that he might invite faith.

C. Faith is a necessary ingredient to receiving anything from God.

D. The man's faith was fixed upon the God ready to act, not the action.

E. When faith is fixed upon the object and not the act, it is faith to be a witness.

III. Jesus repeats the miracle of the multiplication of loaves because of His compassion for the Gentiles, and He had a lesson for them.

- A. Start with what you have.
- B. The supply will always meet the demand.
- C. The miracles are never to remain on the physical level—the spirit is central.
 - 1. You must learn to feed on the Lord Jesus.
 - 2. You cannot keep your spirit strong if you do not feed it.
 - 3. The way to know God is feeding upon Jesus through the Word and believing it.
- IV. The Pharisees did not believe Jesus, and Jesus warned against their teaching.
 - A. The Pharisees taught that God was only interested in outward performance.
 - B. How to keep spiritually alive as a believer.
 - 1. We must be responsive in mind and in heart when we face the spiritual "blahs."
 - 2. Look beyond the physical to the spiritual.

3. Remember what God has done for you in the past and lay hold of that truth.

1. What should the object of our faith be? Why is faith invalid if it is just faith in faith itself?

2. What areas of life is it necessary to look beyond the physical? Explain.
