- I. Introduction.
 - A. Text: John 17:9-10.
 - B. This is the great prayer of Jesus before He went to the Garden of Gethsemane.
 - C. In change, we are afraid, like the disciples, even when God is leading us to a higher relationship.
 - D. What Jesus is praying for His disciples, He is actually praying for us.
- II. The theme of Jesus' prayer is that the disciples might be kept.
 - A. The reason for this is that whom you fellowship with is more important than what you do—all other prayers will flow from this.
 - B. Jesus realized the hostility that believers are facing in the world.
 - 1. This is not the world of nature.
 - 2. This is not the world of natural relationships.
 - 3. Worldliness has to do with the philosophies of man.
 - C. Jesus' answer to Romanticism is a life and heart that is committed to Him.
 - D. Only the power that Jesus counts on will keep the believers power in God's name.
 - 1. The name of God stands for all the authority and resources of God.
 - 2. The keeping of the believer from the allurement of the world is a supernatural task. (Jude)
 - 3. Judas never recognized his utter weakness and cast himself on Christ.
 - E. Sanctification. This simply means to put something to the proper use.
 - F. Our part is simply to believe the truth.
 - 1. We must believe that God has told us the truth.
 - 2. This is the value to the Christian faith.
 - G. God protects us even when our faith fails, but we can only go as far as our faith takes us as well.
